BE SAFE, BE EMPATHETIC

In their innocent excitement children can often ‘accidentally’ hurt each other, by running too quickly, by not watching for others, or by pushing through to achieve a goal. As parents, I am sure that you know that considerate, kind empathetic behaviour is often not an event but a process. We all look to those teachable moments that will assist our children in being good friends and empathetic, kind hearted individuals.

What we do:

Staff are regularly instructed on diligent supervision during recess and at entry and dismissal. Following the bell, staff immediately work to clear the yard and gather the children into orderly lines. Although staff visibility is limited to one or two individuals as students line-up, all staff share entry supervision within the school i.e., stairwells, hallways, doorways.

We also:

- ✓ Review school policies and rules regularly during assemblies, announcements and in the classroom.
- ✓ Connect the virtues to our lives.
- ✓ Remind children to be conscious of others, watch where you are going, slow down, play calmly, say you are sorry and offer support to someone you have injured.
- ✓ Encourage children to learn from mistakes.
- ✓ Instruct children on appropriate play.

Simple things parents can do to develop skills of empathy:

- ✓ Allow someone to enter through a door before you.
- ✓ Stop, give eye contact and help out if you bump into someone.
- ✓ With younger children, focus on one skill at a time... hands to yourself, lining up quietly, calmly taking a turn.

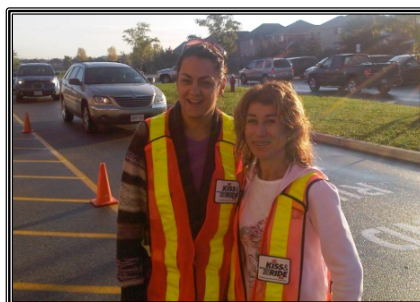

VOLLEYBALL

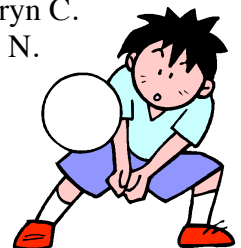

OCTOBER PROGRESS REPORTS

With the release of *Growing Success, Assessment, Evaluation and Reporting in Ontario Schools (2010)*, a number of changes have occurred in reporting practices in elementary schools as outlined in the green sheet sent home at the end of September. There will no longer be three report cards per year. Instead, you will be receiving a progress report to be sent home on October 25, and 2 provincial report cards to be sent home on January 31, 2012 and June 26, 2012.

The progress report provides initial information, early in the school year, about a student's progress. It is designed to show a student's development of the learning skills and work habits, as well as a student's general progress in working towards the achievement of curriculum expectations (*Growing Success*, pg. 50). For these reasons, the October Progress Report does not include marks.

RECESS

All students are expected to dress appropriately for weather conditions and go outdoors for recess. Please ensure that your child has a pair of warm boots for the winter months. For many children, a spare pair of socks, gloves or clothing may save a parent a trip to the school. In the event of inclement weather, students will be kept indoors. In the event of wet, muddy or icy conditions the students will remain on paved areas. During recess, supervision is restricted to the playground areas. If your child is not well enough to participate in outdoor recess, please consider keeping him/her at home. Personnel on yard duty are easily recognizable to students as they carry recess bags, megaphones and/or wear brightly coloured vests.

FIT AND FUN

In an effort to support a positive school climate Mrs. Cheung, Mrs. Misiewicz and Mrs. Aquino will be starting a lunch hour intramural program for primary level students. Running one day a week, this program will teach positive play skills, conflict resolution and cooperation. MEDICATION REMINDER

If your child needs to take medication at school, we must adhere to the following protocol:

1. Parents are to complete an "Authorization for Storage and Administration of Prescribed Medication" form, available at the school office. This form does require a physician's signature. Medications cannot be distributed by school staff without the proper board documentation. The school cannot modify or alter the prescription in any way.
2. Send the medication in the proper prescription or over the counter (OTC) container. No baggies, envelopes or tin foil please.
3. For OTC medication, advise when and what dosage your child requires. Parents are responsible for ensuring that all medication and forms are updated annually. Please be aware that school staff **cannot** administer medication. The student must be able to take the medication alone, otherwise you or your designate should come to the school to assist them.

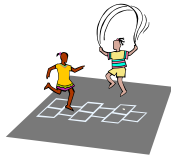

SAFE SCHOOL INITIATIVES

At St. Albert of Jerusalem School we have developed a series of measures that help to ensure the safety of your children. With the support of our students, teachers, administrators and parents, a commitment has been made to make the school a safe place for all. We are certain that our combined efforts will make a safer environment for everyone. Some of the many measures we have taken are...

Line –Painting: There are a variety of games painted on the tarmac of our schoolyard. These include hopscotch, four-square, pump rings, hand ball squares and circles. Basketball nets are also available to our primary, junior and intermediate students. Staff have begun to review the instructions to these games so that our children can enjoy active, safe and fun recesses.



Parent Areas: We have initiated an area where our parents can wait for their children without interrupting play or being mistaken as a school supervisor. This area is recognized by the painted areas on the south side of the yard, and by the fenced-off area just west of the grade three entrance area.

Student In-service: Our students will be trained on the signs, symptoms and dangers of food allergies. We hope they become our strongest allies in keeping the school safe for all.

Peace Pals: Many of our grade five students have volunteered to act as Peace Pals. Mrs. DiFazio, Mrs. Pandullo, Mrs. MacIntosh and Mrs. Mol will provide training for our students on October 7th. The Peace Pals are available at morning and afternoon recess to lead our primary students in co-operative games.

Yard Schedules: In order to provide fairness in the use of the soccer goal posts and field, we have provided intermediate students honours at lunch recess and the junior students have access to the goal post during the morning and afternoon periods.

Restricted Access to the School: All entrances other than the front doors, are locked during the school day.

Visitors to the School: All parents and visitors entering the school are expected to stop at the office, sign in and receive an identification tag. We respectfully ask that you do not accompany your child or go unannounced to the door of his/her class. If you have to pick up your child, speak to the teacher, or drop something off, we will be glad to assist you in the office. All doorways are clearly marked with signs indicating that **all** visitors must report to the office. Staff and students are expected to report any visitors without identification tags to the office immediately.

Washrooms: Washrooms are checked for intruders before the start of the school day. Students are informed and trained that only children have access to their assigned washrooms. All adults use the washrooms specified as adult. Primary aged children travel in pairs when using the washroom during class hours.

Kiss–N–Ride and Buses: Safe arrival is paramount at our school. Parents using the Kiss-N-Ride lanes are assured that a safe drop off for the children is provided when they follow the direction of the Kiss-N-Ride volunteers. Bus students are trained in school bus safety. Teacher supervisors are assigned to safely load and off-load the buses.

Emergency Evacuation: Teachers and students regularly practice emergency evacuation procedures. These include safe exit from the building in the event of fire, precautions in the event of a bomb threat and safety actions to be taken in the event of an intruder alert. In the unforeseen event that we must evacuate the school for emergency purposes, our students will evacuate to St. Therese of the Child Jesus Catholic School on Forest Park Drive.

Attendance: As mentioned in an earlier newsletter, our attendance phone line is our connection with the safe arrival of your child. All children that have not been reported as absent are confirmed absent by our safe entry protocol.

Criminal Reference Checks: Parents are reminded of the Ministry and Board Policy that requires all volunteers to provide the school with a Criminal Reference Check before they begin working with students. For the upcoming year we request that all parents volunteering for field trips also provide a criminal reference check.

Parents who have previously volunteered at St. Albert of Jerusalem School are required to complete an Offence Declaration form before beginning their duties at the school. **For more information or forms, please contact the school.**

SAFE ALL-SEASONAL TIPS and NOTES

Tell your children to always tell you where they are going and with whom.

Tell your children never to go anywhere with a stranger.

Tell them never to talk to strangers or take anything from them.

Teach your children what a “safe” stranger is, in the event they need help...i.e.:...a police officer...a fire fighter...a teacher....etc...

Develop a “what if” game to get children thinking about how they would respond if they felt threatened or afraid.

Teach your children to TALK to you immediately when someone does anything that makes them feel uncomfortable.

Encourage your children to use a buddy system as an alternative to walking alone.

Avoid having your child’s name clearly visible on any piece of clothing or accessory. A stranger may read their name and call it out to your child, fooling your child into believing this person knows them.

Encourage your child not to walk home with exposed electronic equipment (ipods, cellphones, etc). This leaves your child vulnerable to theft.



HALLOWEEN SAFETY

Halloween will soon be upon us, and although it is an exciting time of the year for our children, it is also a time to recall a few safety reminders. **Please remind your children of safety guidelines for Halloween:**

- ☺ Not to wear a face mask, so your child will be able to see clearly.
- ☺ Wear light coloured clothing, so drivers can see them.
- ☺ Carry a flashlight, so your child will be able to see on dark streets.
- ☺ Go out with an adult, or an older brother or sister, if under 10 years of age.
- ☺ Stay away from cars, and friendly strangers in cars.
- ☺ Watch for cars, and look both ways when crossing the street.
- ☺ Wear their costumes above their shoes, so they will not trip.
- ☺ Not to eat any treats until they are home, and an adult has inspected them.
- ☺ Not to damage anyone else's property.
- ☺ Start trick or treating early, and be home by 8:30 p.m.

Given today's safety concerns, it is never a good idea to leave your child unattended. Please make alternative arrangements for the care of your children prior to 8:15 a.m.

SAFETY IN THE SCHOOL YARD

Everyone wants a peaceful school yard, full of students who play nicely with each other and show kindness and acceptance to all. As parents you want your children to be respected and to show respect to others. Throughout the year we focus on many activities that will assist children in playing safely and respectfully. At regular meetings our staff is in-serviced on active school yard supervision; they are alerted to activities that indicate unsafe play. The school staff is diligent in watching for bullying behaviour, unsafe play or yard conditions, and playful activity that may lead to aggressive behaviour.

Given all of this, it is recognized that children are children and do not always make safety conscious decisions. Be it at home or at school, accidents can happen and the best of children can sometimes place themselves in harmful positions.

Like you, the staff of St. Albert of Jerusalem want children to have fun at recess while practicing safe, active and appropriate play. In order to achieve this goal we share with you **some** of the many practices we reinforce during announcements, within our classrooms and while on recess supervision. Your assistance in reinforcing these rules will help in keeping all the children safe while at school... and maybe while playing in your neighbourhood as well!

OUTDOOR PLAY

ACCEPTABLE BEHAVIOURS:

- ✓ Respect each other by being polite, friendly and cooperative.
- ✓ Including others to play in games.
- ✓ Choosing to play fairly and safely when playing games.
- ✓ Playing with acceptable toys and equipment.
- ✓ Respecting school property and the environment.
- ✓ Lining up quietly when the bell rings.



UNACCEPTABLE BEHAVIOURS

- ⊗ Standing in the middle of, or walking through, active games such as football or soccer.
- ⊗ Leaving school property without permission.
- ⊗ Calling names, harassing or making fun of other people.
- ⊗ Swearing and/or using inappropriate language.
- ⊗ Making inappropriate or offensive gestures.
- ⊗ Aggressive or Rough behaviours:
 - fighting
 - pushing or shoving
 - tripping
 - grabbing or lifting someone
 - checking or hitting someone
 - hair pulling, scratching, pinching, spitting
- ⊗ Throwing unsafe objects: snowballs, ice, rocks, sticks, sand, etc...
- ⊗ Playing unsafe or rough games: wrestling, tackling, red rover, play-fighting etc...

- ⊗ Littering by throwing wrappers, garbage, food and containers on the yard.
- ⊗ Pulling at trees or breaking branches.
- ⊗ Writing on school pavement or walls.
- ⊗ Disrespecting our neighbours property.

ACCEPTABLE GAMES

PAVEMENT AREAS:

- ✓ Basketball within the designated area
- ✓ Foot hockey alongside the school walls
- ✓ Throwing soft balls (tennis ball) against a side wall
- ✓ Skipping
- ✓ Pavement games: 4 square & hopscotch
- ✓ Bouncing balls with a soft utility ball
- ✓ Playing "pump" with a soft utility ball



FIELD AREAS:

- ✓ Soccer, Flag Football, Soccer Baseball, Foot hockey
 - In soccer, no kicks more than $\frac{1}{4}$ of the field or above waist level
 - Returning someone else's soccer ball with a light pass, not a kick
- ✓ Playing catch with soft balls in an area away from other students.
- ✓ Building snow structures, but no stealing other people's snow.

UNACCEPTABLE TOYS TO BRING TO SCHOOL:

Students are NOT allowed to bring the following to school:

- ⊗ Hardballs (can easily cause head injury)
- ⊗ Bats
- ⊗ Hockey sticks
- ⊗ Skateboards, roller blades or scooters (may not ride on school property)
- ⊗ Electronic Games
- ⊗ MP3 players, cell phones, pagers (only to be used off school property)

** If students bring their own soccer or basketballs to school, they should be marked with their names and put away safely in the classroom.

**Play cards, BayBlades and other collectable cards are not allowed at school.

ASKING FOR HELP:

Ask a teacher or yard supervisor on duty for assistance when:

- ✓ an accident or injury has occurred
- ✓ a stranger is in the school yard
- ✓ you or someone else is being bullied
- ✓ you see someone playing unsafely
- ✓ you do not feel well

- ✓ a ball is lost on the school roof or out of school boundaries
