Regular School Attendance and Punctuality

Regular attendance and punctuality are important life skills that apply not only in the educational setting, but also in various other settings and especially in the work place. When a student arrives late, it can be a disruption to his/her learning as well as to the learning of the other pupils in the class. A total of the number of days absent and late are documented and become part of the student's record. Students should arrive on time to line up with their peers when the bell rings. It is important to address frequent absences and late arrivals for non-medical reasons early as they may have a long-term negative impact. **It is a parent's responsibility, as outlined in the Education Act, to ensure that their child is in regular attendance and on time for school.** When regular attendance and punctuality are problematic, a meeting with parents, the principal and other school personal may be required in order to discuss a plan for helping the child improve attendance and/or prompt arrival. Thank you for supporting your child's regular attendance and prompt arrival at school.

Attendance Verification

If your child is going to be late or absent from school, please inform the office at (905) 794-0411. The school has an answering machine to receive messages around the clock. The child's parent or legal guardian must contact the school regarding their child's attendance at school.

Parking Lot Safety

Thank you for your continued efforts in making safe choices in the school parking lot. We have been implementing some strategies that allow parents to have more access to parking spots so **that they should no longer need to park at St. Patrick Church.**



>Please do not park or leave your car unattended in the bus lane or anywhere that there are unauthorized parking signs or fire hydrants at any time. Buses must be able to get through.

>When picking your children up, or driving them to the school, never allow them to cross or walk unattended in the parking lot.

>Never walk between parked buses. Never cross in front of buses. This is extremely dangerous.

>Drive slowly in the school parking lot.

>Please review these safety precautions with relatives or friends who may be picking up your children from school or dropping them off.

Criminal Reference Checks

In compliance with Ministry of Education directives, volunteers in a school are required to provide an original copy of their Criminal Reference Check to the school. If you would like to volunteer on school trips and/or in the school, please pick up a form at the office, complete it and bring it to the local police station. There is no fee for volunteers to have this done and it takes from 4 to 6 weeks. Please try to do this early to avoid disappointment in not getting the form back in time to attend school excursions. Parents, who have already had this done for our school, will be asked to complete a declaration form after one year, rather than having another criminal reference check completed.

Minimizing Disruptions to Classes

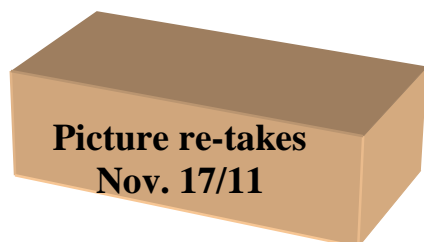
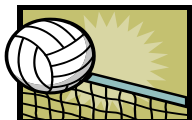
We appreciate continued parental help and support in minimizing disruptions to classes, whenever possible. By trying our best not to disturb classes, except in very important situations, we are reducing disruptions to quality teaching and learning time. Your cooperation with the following is a great help: (a) sending a note in advance to your child's teacher when your child needs to be picked up early, then meeting them in the office and signing them out; (b) when picking your child up early, doing so closer to recess or lunch time (c) when delivering lunch to school, writing your child's and the teacher's names on lunch bags and leaving them on the table in the foyer; (d) whenever possible, please try to avoid calling the school at the last minute to ask us to inform your child of changes in routine; especially close to the end of the day when it is very busy and (e) informing relatives and caregivers, who may be dropping off or picking up your child of school procedures. We understand that there will be times when disruptions will be necessary and unavoidable. Thanks for your help.

Reporting Head Injuries

Even when it may appear to be insignificant, we inform parents of all head injuries at school which are reported to us. We do this in recognition of the potential danger of any injury involving the head area. We are not intending to alarm you, rather to keep you informed. Please remind your children to let a staff member know if they bump/injure their head at school.

Retrieving Balls/Items off School Property

Please join us in reminding your child to make safe choices and not to climb the fence or leave school property to retrieve balls etc. Should a situation arise where a ball or personal item ends up off school property, in the parking lot or in one of our neighbour's yards, pupils should approach a teacher for assistance. Students are reminded to play away from the fences during recess times.

Peanut and Nut Allergies

There are students in our school who have severe peanut or nut allergies, which are life threatening. Allergic people exposed to peanuts, nuts and their by-products, or residues are at risk of suffering a serious reaction. Some children are so sensitive that even the smell of peanut butter or nuts can cause problems and could be fatal. Because of the seriousness of this condition, everyone's continued cooperation is needed in **not sending foods to school with peanuts, nuts or their by-products.** In the event that a child accidentally brings a lunch or snack with peanuts, nuts or their by-products, this student will be sent to eat their lunch in the office or in another room. Following are some strategies that parents, students and staff can use to help keep our school safer for children with peanut or nut allergies.

- Avoid sending foods from home that may contain nuts or nut products such as peanut oil, peanut butter, peanut sauce, peanut meal, mixed nuts, ground nuts and mandalona nuts. Hydrolyzed vegetable protein may also contain peanuts and is not considered safe for people with peanut allergies.
- Read food labels carefully. Avoid products that do not carry a list of ingredients. It's important to read food labels each time you buy a product that will be eaten by a child with a nut allergy, or by a child in the same classroom, because products and production facilities often change.
- Clean hands and face immediately after eating peanut butter or nut containing products before heading off to school or at school; if brought by accident.
- Avoid sharing snacks and drinks. Thank you for your on-going cooperation in helping to make our school safer for students with peanut/nut allergies.

Treats for Birthdays and Special Occasions

If you would like to send treats to school for your child's birthday, it is best to send a non-food treat such as stickers/pencils etc. to celebrate your child's birthday rather than food of any kind. This helps us reduce the risk to severely allergic students. If you would like to send food, the food item must have a peanut-free ingredients label to indicate that it was made in a guaranteed to be peanut-free facility. This policy is in compliance with Sabrina's Law. Thank you for your attention to this important matter. ***Please bear this in mind as you consider sending treats for Halloween.***



Progress Reports

Grades 1 to 8 pupils will bring home a Progress Report on **Tuesday, October 25, 2011.** It will communicate the student's progress as well as some next steps. Teachers are contacting parents if an interview is required at this time. Parents may also request an interview. See the memo that was recently sent home to grades 1 to 8 parents. Kindergarten students will not receive a progress report.

Primary and Junior EQAO Results

Congratulations to staff and students on a great job with the Primary/Junior EQAO Assessments which were administered last June 2011. The following information indicates the percentage of students scoring at levels 3 and 4. Staff is studying the results carefully to inform practice.

- *Primary Reading: 62%*
- *Primary Writing: 81%*
- *Primary Mathematics: 69%*

School results in Primary Reading and Writing were higher than last year's results, while Primary Mathematics results were slightly lower than last year's results. School Primary Reading results were slightly lower than the Board results, while Writing results were higher than the Board results, and Primary Mathematics results were the same as the Board results.

- *Junior Reading: 93%*
- *Junior Writing: 93%*
- *Junior Mathematics: 71%*

School results in Junior Reading, Writing and Mathematics were higher than last year's results. School Junior Reading, Writing and Mathematics results were significantly higher than the Board results.

Special Assignment Teacher

Once again this year, Dufferin-Peel has a Special Assignment teacher working in each school to assist with curriculum implementation. Our SAT, Mrs. Moncur is working in partnership with classroom teachers to assist with implementing high yield, best practice teaching strategies.

CCAT Testing for Grade 4 students

During the last week of Oct. grade 4's will be administered the CCAT (Canadian Cognitive Abilities Test). Results from this test are used to help identify pupils who may be eligible for enhanced/gifted programming in the future. See notice sent home to grade 4 parents from Mrs. Hawton.

Student Accident Insurance

As required by the Education Act and the Ministry of Education, the Dufferin-Peel Catholic District School Board annually provides parents with information about cost-effective student accident insurance coverage. Although enrolment is voluntary, the Board encourages parents to take advantage of the inexpensive insurance coverage, especially if their child/children participate in sports, excursions/field trips, or, if parents do not have dental insurance coverage. Information is provided to all families in the first week of school. Also information can be obtained from the office.

Children's Aid Society

In April 2000, the Child and Family Services Act was amended and a new law came into effect concerning our obligation to report concerns about children who may need protection. Please see the attached notice.

Fire Drills & Lockdown Procedures

In accordance with Ministry regulations, three fire drills will be conducted in the fall and three in the spring per school year. While we hope that a real fire situation never arises, this practice helps prepare students in the event of a real fire. In addition, our School Board has established lockdown procedures should a high risk incident involving weapons occur in the school, or on school property, that could endanger the lives and/or the safety of students and/or staff. We will practice the *Emergency Lockdown Procedure* with pupils two times during the school year and review it from time to time.

Personal Electronic Devices (PEDs) cell phones/cameras

Personal Electronic Devices (PEDs) are wireless and/or portable electronic handheld equipment that include, but are not limited to, existing and emerging mobile communication systems and smart technologies (cell phones, smartphones, walkie-talkies, pagers, etc.), portable internet devices (mobile managers, Blackberry handsets, etc.), PDAs (Palm organizers, pocket PCs, etc.), handheld entertainment systems (video games, CD players, compact DVD players, MP3 players, iPods, walkmen, etc), digital or film cameras, digital or analogue audio recorders or video recorders (tape recorders, camcorders, etc.), spy gadgets (spy cameras, covert listening devices, etc.), and any other convergent communication technologies that do any number of the previously mentioned functions. PEDs also include any current or emerging wireless handheld technologies or portable IT systems that can be used for the purpose of communication, entertainment, data management, word processing, wireless internet access, image capture/recording, sound recording and information transmitting /receiving /storing, etc.

The Use of (PEDs) at School (cameras/cell phones)

To promote respect for the dignity of all members of our school community and to enhance pupil achievement and safety, the use of a PED is strictly prohibited in school (including portables) or during school related activities (such as retreats, field trips, sports events, etc). Failure to comply with this policy may result in the confiscation of the PED and/or disciplinary action. The school and the Dufferin-Peel Catholic District School Board assume no responsibility for the loss, recovery, repair or replacement for any PED brought onto school property. It is the policy of the Dufferin Peel Catholic District School Board that PEDs are to be kept out-of-sight, turned off and not used within school premises or during school sanctioned events. To prevent the loss or damage of PEDs, the school encourages students to leave their PEDs at home.

Volunteers in the School

If you are interested in volunteering at St. Patrick School, please leave your name at our school office and someone will be in touch with you.



Volunteers are expected to have a Criminal Reference Check on file at the school office and must complete an orientation session before working with students. During the orientation session, the volunteer coordinator addresses various aspects of volunteering in the school. All volunteers must sign in at the office and receive their name tag before proceeding to another part of the school. The name tag is to be worn and visible until the volunteer signs out and leaves the school.

Riding on Other School Buses

Occasionally, we receive requests for students to ride on a friend's school bus in order to attend a social event or similar function after school. Please be reminded that bus transportation is provided to the stop nearest your home and to the school from that stop. We are unable to adjust this policy by allowing students to change buses from time to time. As a result, permission will not be given for a student to ride on a different bus to go to a friend's home after school. Only in extenuating circumstances can we consider parental requests to make one time bus stop changes. These requests must be made in writing and provided to the principal a few days in advance of the requested change. The child's parent must then complete & sign a new form from the Transportation Department the day before the child goes on another bus.



School Bus Safety

Parents/guardians are asked to review these important bus safety rules with your children from time to time. We will continue to review them at school.

- Be at the bus stop on time; (approximately, ten minutes before scheduled arrival time)
- While waiting for the bus, students should be standing well away from the roadway until the bus has stopped;
- Never play around close to the road; and never reach under the bus for something;
 - Be ready to board bus in an orderly line, youngest first;
- Students should not cross the road before the school bus arrives at their stop, unless supervised by their parent/guardian;
- Students should wait for direction from the Bus Driver and check the traffic before walking across the road and never, cross behind the bus;
- Look all ways when crossing the road, stay alert;
- When the bus stops, students should approach the doorway in single file and board in single file using the handrail, then sit down;
- Kindergarten & grade 1 pupils must sit at the front of bus:
 - Always remain seated while the bus is moving, if it is necessary to stand up, hold on tightly;
 - Never throw anything in the bus, on the floor or out the window; Keep the aisles clear of all objects; (lunches, books, bags etc.)
 - Never shout, or cause any other unnecessary noise; be especially quiet at railway crossings;
 - Keep the windows closed, unless you have permission from the driver to open them; Never put any part of your body out of an open window;
 - Obey the bus driver, teachers and bus patrollers;
 - Remain in assigned seats;
 - Do not damage the bus in any way;
 - Do not eat or drink while traveling on the bus except under special circumstances such as -- diabetes;
 - Once you get off the bus, move well away from it, out of the 'Danger Zones'; Always cross when the flashers and stop arm on the bus are activated; Do not wait for the bus to leave before crossing; Exit the bus carefully, holding the handrail, and walk 10 giant steps beyond the front bumper, look both ways, and wait for the driver's signal before crossing the road;
 - Students should not chase the school bus, after it has begun to move away;
 - Pupils should not lean on or touch a moving bus;
 - It is best for students not to carry papers or other such items in their hands as they embark or disembark. We remind pupils regularly to carry everything in their bags whenever possible. This helps avoid potentially dangerous situations in which students find themselves chasing after items that have fallen or blown away.

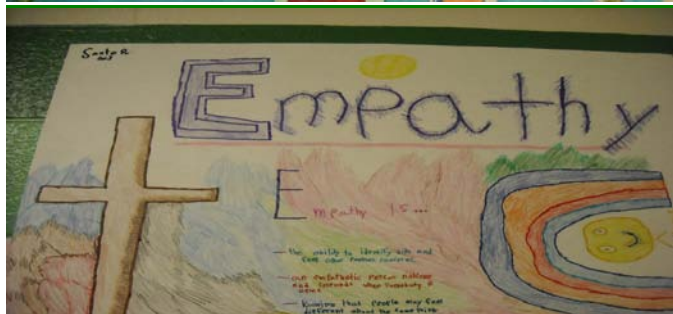
November 1st - All Saints Day

CANADIAN MATS 4 HAITI

IN JANUARY 2010, HAITI WAS HIT WITH A DEVASTATING EARTHQUAKE. TODAY, OVER 1.5 MILLION ARE STILL HOMELESS. SCHOOLS IN ONTARIO ARE COLLECTING THE EXTERIOR COLOURED MILK BAGS TO CREATE BUG REPELLENT SLEEPING MATS



Only In Canada, eh?



BY SIMPLY CUTTING, TYING AND WEAVING MILK BAGS, WE CAN CREATE BUG-REPELLENT SLEEPING MATS FOR CHILDREN IN HAITI

..a simple GREEN initiative

COLLECT the outside coloured milk bags (clean & dry)
FLATTEN bags and store in large computer paper boxes
FOLD & CUT Fold bag twice lengthwise, cut off 2" at top & 1/8" at bottom, discard. Cut off 1" strips (loops) with sharp scissors
TIE each loop together with another for a long continuous strand
WIND strands into a baseball-size ball & secure with elastic
CROCHET a 36" x 60" mat with a 6.5mm crochet hook

Thank you very much to everyone in our school community for collecting milk bags and sending them to school. We are sending them to others who will cut them up into strips, crochet them into mats & get them to Haiti.

When sending bags to school, please do the following:



Fold in half.



Then fold in half again.

500 Milk Bags = 1 Mat



A soft mat to sit or sleep on is priceless in Haiti. These remarkably sturdy & durable mats protect sleeping children & adults & cut parasitic infestations up to 40%. Hookworms whose larvae breed in soil & penetrate the skin, can cause a range of serious development problems in the young. Unlike cloth or sheets, the plastic milk bags mats repel biting insects, scorpions & poisonous spiders. The sleeping mat provides a bit of cushion & warmth for people who are sleeping on the bare, sometimes wet ground, or insect-infested palm leaves. The mats can be hung up to air in the day & washed in the river when dirty. They are used almost endlessly & can last up to 20 years!



CONGRATULATIONS MIMIKA! Last June, St. Patrick School pupils were invited to save milk bags during the summer and bring them to school in the fall to be used for crocheting mats for children in Haiti to sleep on. Our grade 7 pupil, Mimika decided that she could get a lot more bags if she asked people outside of our school community to collect the bags too. So she wrote an article for a local paper inviting shoppers from Garden Foods in Bolton to drop off their milk bags there. This resulted in 5,800 milk bags being collected as well as 60 balls of milk bags that had been cut up into strips. All of this in just two months! Wow! Mimika's initiative and leadership allowed her to mobilize many people who also wanted to make a positive difference! Way to go Mimika!

School Bus Driver Appreciation Day

On Wednesday, October 19th St. Patrick School students will take the opportunity to express appreciation to our school bus drivers for driving them safely to and from school every day. Thank you to our school bus drivers for the awesome work that they do every day in transporting our precious students safely to and from school and on various school excursions.



World Teacher Appreciation Day

On Oct. 5, we celebrated World Teacher Appreciation Day, along with over 100 countries across the globe. Teachers influence and touch lives in powerful ways. They lead students on their faith journey, influence career and life choices, and work hard to teach the skills that students need to participate and compete in the world. A sincere and heartfelt thank you to the teachers of St. Patrick School for their commitment to Catholic education and for the outstanding work they do with our students daily.



Dogs Not Allowed on School Property

Please do not bring dogs, or other pets, onto school property. Even if on a leash and normally passive or friendly, your pet may respond in an unexpected manner if surrounded by a group of curious children. While most of us are pet lovers, some youngsters are frightened by animals and may get nervous or anxious when approached by one. Also, other children in our community suffer from allergies that are often triggered by pet fur or pet dander. Your co-operation is appreciated.



Bullying Prevention

At St. Patrick School, we continue to focus on creating and sustaining a safe, caring and inclusive school through planning and implementing various initiatives such as the Peel Health Bullying Prevention Program and the virtues initiative. Also, reminders of appropriate behaviours and how to make good choices are communicated regularly to students. Parents can help by having discussions with your child about making good choices at school and encouraging him/her to seek help from school staff when necessary.

Textbooks

School textbooks are loaned to students for the school year. The expectation is that students will take good care of textbooks and return them at the end of the school year. Students are responsible for these books and may be asked to pay for lost or damaged books. Please encourage your child to take good care of school textbooks. Thank you.

Sleep Information from Peel Health

Lack of sleep affects the ability of students to learn. Research has shown that a good night sleep following the introduction of new information and skills, greatly improves a student's ability to remember content and perform tasks. Motivation, vigilance, and attention-span all deteriorate with less sleep, leading to poorer school achievement.



Lack of Sleep Affects Mood

Irritability, frustration, impulse control and oppositional behaviour are all symptoms which can be related to sleep deprivation. Tired children can become more active and "wired" as the day progresses.



Lack of Sleep Affects Our Physical Health

We are more vulnerable to colds and other viruses because infection-fighting cells become less active following sleep loss. Glucose metabolism, stress hormones and the hormone that tells the body it's full are all affected. This can make a person more prone to diabetes, stress-related health problems and obesity. Further, we become more accident-prone as reaction time and concentration are affected.



How much sleep is enough?

6 to 11 year olds:

Minimum of 9 hours

12 years old and up:

8.5 to 10 hours (depending on puberty)

Adults - 7 to 8 hours
