

This Info-Sheet on Human Trafficking provides guidance for parents to protect their children from Human Trafficking. For more information, refer to the Government of Ontario's information page found at www.ontario.ca/page/human-trafficking.

Human Trafficking is an unjustifiable violation of the victims' freedom and dignity, which are integral dimensions of the human person willed and created by God. This is why it must be considered, without a doubt, a crime against humanity. —Pope Francis

WHAT IS HUMAN TRAFFICKING?

- Human Trafficking is an indictable offence under the Criminal Code of Canada.
- It includes sex trafficking, which is the sexual exploitation, recruiting, harbouring, transporting, obtaining, or providing of a person for the purpose of sex.
- It involves the use of force, physical or psychological coercion, or deception.
- Human Trafficking is NOT prostitution or sex work. It does not involve consent. Young people under the age of 18 cannot consent to participate in prostitution or sex work.
- Some people who are trafficked are controlled and monitored constantly; others may not realize or acknowledge what is happening to them. Fear of their trafficker or law enforcement may prevent them from seeking help.

WHO CAN BE AT RISK?

Anyone can be at risk of human trafficking, however, due to the impacts of colonialism, systemic oppression and other forms of discrimination, some children and youth face increased risk, including those who are female-identified, Indigenous, Black, racialized, 2SLGBTQ+, differently-abled children, youth in care, newcomers and those with language barriers.

HUMAN TRAFFICKING IN ONTARIO AND THE REGION OF PEEL

Human trafficking is one of the fastest-growing crimes worldwide, and Ontario is a hub.

- 62% of Canadian human-trafficking cases originate in the GTA.
- The majority of all police-reported incidents of human-trafficking in Canada occur in Ontario.
- 22% of police-reported victims of human trafficking are children under the age of 18.
- School-aged children and youth are prime targets for sexual exploitation.

POSSIBLE SIGNS OF HUMAN TRAFFICKING

- Change in personality (e.g., attitude, new friends, being withdrawn)
- Change in appearance and mood
- Being secretive about their activities (e.g. leaving the home without the permission of a parent/caregiver)
- Having more than one cell phone or a phone that you have not approved
- Appears extremely tired
- Change in school performance and attendance
- In possession of hotel or Airbnb keys
- Dating someone and/or having friends that you do not know
- Refusing to answer questions about their online activity and/or friends or contacts.
- Expensive gifts that they can't afford, and you did not purchase

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WHO IS TRAFFICKING?

Strangers, acquaintances, friends, social media friends, intimate partners, and family members are trafficking. Traffickers may pose as romantic interests or present as a professional.

PREVENTION & SUPPORT RESOURCES FOR PARENTS

WHAT TO DO IF YOU ARE WORRIED THAT YOUR CHILD MAY BE INVOLVED IN HUMAN TRAFFICKING?

- Talk to your child about your worry. Be open in your dialogue.
- Get more information from credible resources. Refer to section *Where to go for Help in The Community?*
- Keep having open communication with your child.
- Consider monitoring your child's online activity.
- Reach out for help from the community and/or your child's school.

- Engage in self-care – this is a sensitive topic for parents and children alike, so take time to ensure you are emotionally ready for these conversations.
- Inspire hope – help children or young people leave with a sense of hope and a plan for sharing concerns with a trusted adult, rather than carrying the concerns alone.
