

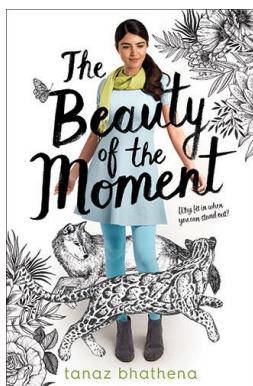
All Our Broken Pieces

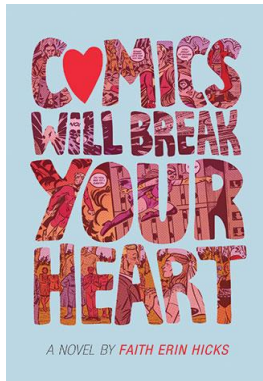
Baggage

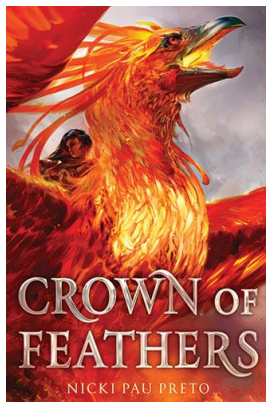
The Beauty of the Moment

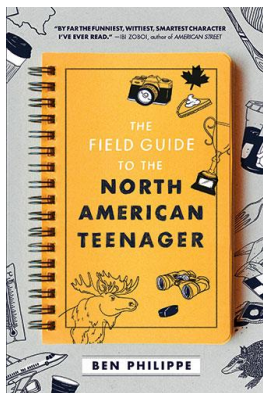

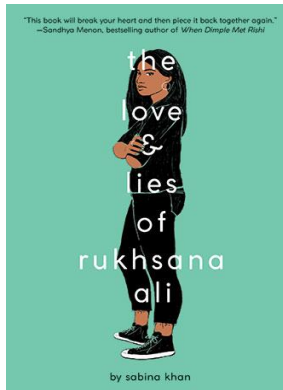

In a world ruled by fierce warrior queens, a grand empire was built upon the backs of Phoenix Riders—legendary heroes who soared



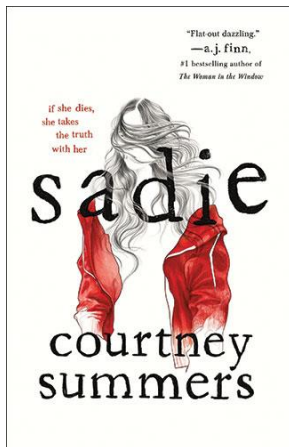
Field Guide to the North American Teenager

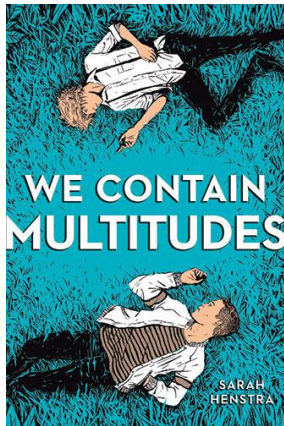
Sadie
